MUALA LUMPUR, Tues.

— A major video tape distributor has lost \$1 million as a result of rampant video piracy in the Kepong and Jinjang districts here.

Golden Star general manager Sunny Yap claimed that the compa-ny's revenue had gone down by at least \$1 mil-lion because of these op-

lion because of these operations.

He said Golden Star used to collect more than \$2 million a year in tape rentals and licensee fees from these areas.

Mr Yap hoped the courts would impose more deterrent punishments, adding that fines

were ineffective because the syndicates were very

rich.

He said the heaviest fine so far for a copyright offence was \$50,000.

"Such amounts are negligible to people who make much more than that in one month alone," he said, adding that jail terms would be more effective.

Referring to a suit three years ago, he said al-though the company was awarded \$2.7 million, it was unable to collect a single sen because the culprit could not be located.
Golden Star, which is the sole distributor for

Hong Kong's TVB videos, has taken legal action against at least two video shops in Bangsar and Sri

shops in Bangsar and Sri Kembangan in Selangor this month.

Golden Star's counsel
Jerald Gomez said today that the Bangsar shop op-erator was jailed for con-tempt of court for defying an injunction obtained by the distributor to stop her from further duplicating and renting out tapes without the company's permission.

In the Sri Kembangan case, he said the video shop owner was charged with copyright infringe-ment and fined \$10,000 in default six months jail.

Golden Star gets order against video centre

KUALA LUMPUR: Golden Star Video, the sole distributor of Hong Kong-Television Broadcast (TVB) videos in Malaysia, yesterday obtained a permanent High Court injunction restraining a local video centre from infringing its copyright.

Mr Justice Datuk Dr Zakaria Yatim granted the order against Pusat Video & Elektronik New Times, its manager, Mr Loh Sang, and an employee, Mr Loh Yit Pun, and their agents from reproducing or distributing any films for which Golden Star is the exclusive licensee.

He also granted Golden Star damages for "conversion" (using another party's property for own benefits), damages and costs.

He ordered Pusat Video & Electronik New Times to deliver all the

copies of videos that it had pirated.

He made the order in chambers after hearing the inter-parte application by Golden Star's counsel, Mr Jerald Allen Gomez.

The counsel for Pusat Video & Electronik New Times, and the other two

defendants were not present.
Joining Golden Star as plaintiff was
Television Broadcast Limited (Hong
Kong TVB).

In its statement of claims, Golden Star and Hong Kong TVB said Pusat Video & Electronik New Times, which was not registered with the Registry of Businesses, had dealt in pirated

Videotape company ordered to observe copyright

KUALA LUMPUR, Thurs.—
The High Court today restrained a videotape company, its manager and an employee from infringing the copyright of Television Broadcast Limited of Hong Kong and Golden Star Video Sdn Bhd.

The order against Pusat Video & Elektronik New Time, Mr Loh Sang and Mr Loh Yit Pun was granted by Mr Justice Dr Zakaria Mohamed Yatim after a hearing in his chambers.

Television Broadcast Limited and Golden Star, represented by Mr Jerald Allen Gomez, obtained an order restraining the respondents from reproducing, letting out or distributing for the purpose of trade, any film belonging to the plaintiffs.

The respondents are also restrained from converting to their own use the copyright in such films and the infringing copies.

Zakaria also granted oth-

right in such films and the infringing copies.

Zakaria also granted other orders sought by the plaintiffs relating to damages and the delivery of all infringing copies of such films in the respondents' possession, power, custody or control.

films in the respondents' possession, power, custody or control.

An inquiry on the damages suffered by the plaintiffs will be heard before a Senior Assistant Registrar on a date to be fixed.

In their statement of claim, the plaintiffs said that Pusat Video & Elektronik New Time operated a business of letting out videotapes to the public at Jalan Panggung, Sri Kembangan, Serdang.

The business was not registered with the Registry of Business, they said.

They also said that at the premises, the company had a considerable quantity of recording equipment which it used for the reproducing of unlicensed copies in the forms of videotapes of films of which the ownership belonged to Television Broadcast and others.

They further claimed that the company distributed the copies for hire for the purposes of trade.

The plaintiffs said that a total of 476 infringing copies were seized from the premises between Jan 12 and July 13, 1990.
